Too Small? Not!

















Black Reign '93

Mustangs Return To Play Offs.

After posting a respectable 7-3 record in '92, Coach Butch Toner and his Loretto Mustangs had plenty of reasons for optimism as they prepared for the 1993 football season. Eight experienced seniors

returned from '92 and joined ranks with eighty determinated underclassmen, making the '93 squad one of the largest in LHS history. 
It took Loretto an extra day and a little over one quarter to get the football season underway. Bad weather prompted the Mustangs to postpone the season opener until Saturday night. The Mustangs needed only one quarter to get organized, before rolling to an impressive 40-0 win over the visiting Cannon County Lions.

The winning streak was short lived however as the Mustangs found themselves faced the following week with a determined

Spring Hill squad. The Raiders, led by star quarterback Bernard Oden, soundly defeated the Mustangs 49-20.

Loretto quickly got back on track as they traveled to Greenhill and claimed their second shutout of the season. Mt. Pleasant's luck proved no better than the Pirates, as the Tigers allowed two fourth quarter touchdown passes by Justin Tidwell and a come-from-behind victory for the Mustangs.

A Giles Co. player finds the going tough as he runs head first into Kyle James. The Mustangs lost to the Bobcats in spite of tough plays like this one.


The Mustangs dropped three consecutive games against Collinwood, Lewis Co., and Lexington before rebounding with a 35-28 overtime win against Richland that kept their playoff hopes alive.

The Giles County Bobcat defense proved to be more than the Mustangs could handle as they built a 44 point lead before allowing two late touchdowns to narrow the margin 50-20. This loss placed the Mustangs in an unenviable must-win situation against Fairview in the season finale. The Mustangs

met the challenge head-on and won their homecoming game and a place in tournament play by defeating Fairview 28-7. The Mustangs had less luck in the playoffs as they lost to Goodpasture 24-19 during the first round of regional tournament.










The crowd reacts to a Mustang victory during district tournament action against Hickman Co. The Mustangs defeated the Bulldogs before falling to Giles Co. the following game.












