A School-Parent Compact is an agreement that families, students, and teachers develop together. It explains how families and teachers will work together to make sure all students reach grade-level standards.

Effective Compacts:

- Link goals to the SLS Improvement Plan
- Focus on student learning skills
- Teacher's role in developing skills through classroom instruction
- Share strategies families can use at home
- Explain successful communication between school and home

We suggested home learning strategies, families added ideas to make them more specific, and students told us what would help them learn. Meetings are held each year to review the compact to make changes based on student needs.

In the 1st Grade Classroom

The first grade classroom will work with students and families to support student success in reading, math, science, and social studies. Our key communication is our First Grade Student Folders which help students, parents, and teachers stay organized and connected at school and home.

Listed below are some important sections of the binder:

The "Important Notes" section is for communication to and from the teacher and/or school, or money. Test papers will be found in this pocket.

* The Classroom Newsletter will outline the topics, assignments, and news for the week.

* In the folder section labeled "Keep at Home" and "Return to School", you will find papers that should be reviewed nightly. Return the papers in the homework pocket to school after completing.

*The AR section of the folder is for students to keep a log to record AR books they have read and tested on. Students will keep up with the number of points earned for each 9 weeks and an overall total. Goals and awards will be listed in this section of the folder.

At Home

South Lawrence School families should establish routines to promote student success. Here is a list of suggested ideas:

*Check 1st Grade Folder nightly.

*Weekly Homework Packet - Return on Friday

*Return notes in a timely manner.

*Review daily skills/classwork.

*Discuss missed items on any graded work or tests.

*Be positive, encourage success, and help your child relate school lessons to real-life situations.

*Promote lifelong learning.

*Encourage your child to form healthy lifelong habits, including (but not limited to) good sleep habits, well-balanced meals and snacks, proper grooming and hygiene habits, and regular school attendance.

*Make math useful. Connect real-world situations that require math.

*Make reading enjoyable. Read to your children. Allow your child to read to you. Talk about books together. Make reading a fun family activity.

Students thought of the following ideas to make connections between learning at home and at school:

- Talk with my family about new things I am learning in Math and Reading.
