- Focus on student learning skills
- Teacher's role in developing skills through classroom instruction
- Share strategies families can use at home
- Explain successful communication between school and home

District Goals

In the 4th Grade Classroom

The 4th grade classroom will work with students and families to support students' success in reading, math, science, and social studies. Our key communication is our class folders and binders, which help students, parents, and teachers stay organized and connected at school and home. Students will use three-ring binders and class folders to keep track of their assignments in all subject areas.

Listed below are some important sections of the binders:

*The AR log is for students to keep a log to record library books they have read and tested on. Students should keep up with the number of points earned for each 9-week period and the overall total.

*The Math folder also includes extra reference materials in clear sheet protectors to assist students for multiplication fact mastery and math content. Students should refer to these reference materials as needed.

*Google Classroom will have all assignments and make-up work if a student is absent from school. Please check Google Classroom for more info.

At Home

South Lawrence School families should establish routines to promote student success. Here is a list of suggested ideas:

*Return notes in a timely manner.

*Review daily skills/classwork for weekly tests.

*Discuss missed items on weekly tests.

*Be positive, encourage success, and help your child relate school lessons to real-life situations.

*Promote lifelong learning.

*Encourage your child to form healthy lifelong habits, including (but not limited to) good sleep habits, well-balanced meals and snacks, proper grooming and hygiene habits, and regular school attendance.

*Make math useful. Connect real-world situations that require math.

*Math Prodigy is an online game that can be accessed at home to practice math skills.

*Practice math facts in fun or unique ways to promote proficiency in this skill.

*Make reading enjoyable. Read with your children. Talk about the book together. Make this a fun family activity.

Students thought of the following ideas to make connections between learning at home and at school:

- Talk with my family about new concepts I am learning in Math and Reading.
