- Aimsweb - given Fall, Winter, and Spring. This assessment is used to identify learning gaps and determine RTI placement.
- STAR Reading - Given three times a year to determine reading level.
- HMH Math Diagnostic - given Fall, Winter, and spring. The HMH Math diagnostic is used to establish points of instruction.
- Achieve 3000 placement testing (reading)
- Mastery Connect - district wide assessment used to prepare students for TCAP Testing.
- TCAP - End of year assessment to provide feedback on academic progress and how it aligns with grade level expectations

In the 3rd Grade Classroom

The third grade classroom will work with students and families to support student success in reading, math, science, and social studies. Some of our key connections will be:

- Homework folder: The students will utilize the homework folder as a way to keep up with what has been assigned for homework and to bring home any necessary forms from school.
- Our weekly assignment sheet. The assignment sheet is shared with parents via email. Please note that this is a guideline for what we do in class each day; it is subject to change.
- Internet resources to assist with an assortment of math skills, language and grammar resources, and reading and writing assistance for all learners.
- The REMIND app is a method to communicate with your child's teacher.
- Students are responsible for assignments during remote/virtual learning through Google Classroom.

At Home

New Prospect School families should establish routines to promote student success.

Here is a list of suggested ideas:

- Check homework folder daily
- Return notes in a timely manner
- Assist your child with studying for tests.
- Attendance is necessary if your child is well.
- Be positive, encourage success, and help your child relate school lessons to real life situations.
- Promote lifelong learning
- Encourage your child to form healthy lifelong habits, including (but not limited to) good sleep habits, well-balanced meals and snacks, and proper grooming and hygiene habits.
- Check Skyward often
- Check AR online
- Make math useful. Connect real world situations that require math.
- Make reading enjoyable. Read with your child/children. Talk about a book together. Make this a fun family activity.

Our Students

New Prospect School students joined our third grade teachers to develop ideas about how they can succeed in school and reach for the stars in math and reading.

Students brainstormed the following ideas to make connections between learning at home and at school:

- Talk with my family about new concepts I am learning in math and reading.
- Share with parents their homework folder.
- Go over the weekly assignment sheet each night.
- Read at least 20 minutes a day outside of school to build vocabulary and boost reading skills.
- Talk to my teacher about any concerns I have.
- Study my multiplication facts every night.
