- AIMSWeb: Given 3 times a year (*based on percentile) to determine academic progress and RTI placement.
- STAR Reading: Given three times a year to determine reading level.
- HMH Math Diagnostic: Given 3 times a year to establish points of instruction.
- Mastery Connect: District wide assessment used to check for mastery of standards and prepare for TCAP.
- TCAP: End of year assessment to provide feedback on academic progress and how it aligns with grade level expectations.
- Achieve 3000 placement assessment given at the beginning of each school year.
