From the images of student protests in Tiananmen Square in Beijing to the photos of the Berlin Wall being dismantled, we were constantly aware of the ongoing pursuit of freedom and democracy around the world.

The changes that occurred in the eastern bloc nations were probably the most dramatic. Mikhail Gorbachev made sweeping reforms in the U.S.S.R. His innovative policies gave rise to such things as multi-party elections and a McDonald's in Moscow.

Berlin was the site of one of the most surprising events of the year. The Berlin Wall, after separating Berlin for almost three decades, was torn down.

At home, President Bush won a major battle in the war against drugs when he sent U.S. troops to Panama. Two weeks





We picked what we liked, we chose








Programs such as the drivers' education class and girls' softball were once again added to the agenda at LHS.









Sophomore, Donnie Cotton, commented, "I was glad to have a coach who could relate and understand the players." New assistant coaches were Mark Toner, Tony Shirley and John Jacobs. With only five Seniors and as many as fifteen sophomores starting at different times the Mustang record was 2-8.







The 1989-90 Lady Mustangs may have been Coach Jerry Taylor's smallest team, but with veteran All-Star guard Kelli Davis and a nucleus of good shooters returning, the Lady Mustangs again had the potential for a winning season.

An opening win over county rival, Lawrenceburg and three straight wins in the Union University Classic enabled the Lady Mustangs to close the 1989 portion of the schedule with a fine 9-1 record.

The new decade started on rocky ground as the Lady Mustangs dropped three straight to old rivals, Lewisburg, Collinwood, and Lawrenceburg. After regrouping, the Lady Mustangs preceded to win 10 of their 11 remaining seasonal games to finish 19-5 as they entered tournament play.

The tournament season began with a semi-final win over Hickman Co., setting up a big District championship battle. The Lady Mustangs had Lewisburg's number, winning, 62-53. Victories over Portland and Springfield vaulted the Lady Mustangs into a rematch with Lewisburg for the Regional Championship. Down by eight points after a sub-par first half, the Lady Mustangs used an aggressive press and the senior leadership of Kelli Davis to overhaul the Tigerettes for the Regional Championship sending LHS home for a sub-state berth with Stewart County. A last second basket by Shonta Story propelled the Lady Mustangs to qualify for their second State Tournament appearance in three years and twelfth in school history.






## Student Council




#### Gold Record Club




#### Graduation 1990 A Night to Remember



PRINTING.

Volume 43 of the Mustang was printed offset by the Taylor Publishing Company of Dalias, Texas, with the use of single color and two color presses. The first two flats of the book were printed with spot colors process yellow #51 and teal #19. The 7 ¾ x 10 ½ book consisted of 160 pages which were 80 pound enamel paper.

COVER.

The Smyth bound cover was printed in black #75, white #911, and yellow #823 with a lithocote finish. On personalized books individual names were stamped on the cover in black.

TYPE.

Body copy in the opening and closing sections were 12pt. Geneva Standard. Division page copy was also 12pt. Geneva Standard. Throughout the remainder of the book, body copy was 10pt. Geneva Standard. Caption copy in the opening section used 10pt. Geneva Standard. Captions in the rest of the book, including division pages, were 8pt. Geneva Standard. Page numbers and folios were printed in 8pt. Geneva Standard. The opening and closing sections used Geneva Standard headlines, along with headlines lettered by Ms. Donna Geise. The Student Life section used various sizes of Souvenir Bold headlines. The Sports section used various sizes of Geneva Standard headlines, as well as 24pt. Muse Script for page titles. The Organizations section, the Seniors section, and the People section used various sizes of Geneva Standard for headlines. Division pages used headlines lettered by Ms. Donna Geise.

SPECIAL EFFECTS.

The Opening section used a duotone photograph on each double page spread and screens of various percentages of teal #19 and yellow #51. The Student Life section used Taylor pop print #912 and various percentages of a black screen. The Sports section used Taylor pop print #905. The Organizations section used Taylor pop print #913 in a 40% screen. The Seniors section used a 20% black screen. The People section used Taylor pop print #911 in a 40% screen. The Advertisements and Closing sections were printed using a black screen. Division pages were printed using camera-ready artwork that was screened in 40% black.
