District Goals

The Board of Education sets goals for the entire district. The district goals for 2023-24 are:

- Reading- 90% of all students will be reading on grade level by 3rd grade.
- Math- all students will make an increase to 80% on benchmark testing.

- Provide parent reports on academic and behavior progress
- Provide an open line of communication through the Remind App, email, and students' home/school folder
- Teachers will be available to meet with parents throughout the school year at times other than scheduled parent-teacher conferences.
